


American Indians in Oklahoma Indian Removal Act 1830

The Chickasaw Nation

- 13 counties located in south-central Oklahoma
- Non-reservation based
- Population: 307,811
- American Indians: 46,811



Strategic Prevention Framework-Tribal Incentive Grant (SPF-TIG)

- SPF-TIG was awarded to the Southern Plains Tribal Health Board (SPTHB) in 2010
- SPTHB collaborated with four tribal partners to combat substance
 - abuse in Indian Country:
 - Absentee Shawnee Tribe
 - Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes
 - The Chickasaw Nation
 - Comanche Nation





Partnerships For Success (PFS)

- PFS was awarded to the Southern Plains Tribal Health Board (SPTHB) in 2016
- Goals of PFS:
 - Continue utilizing the Strategic Prevention Framework
 - Reduce underage drinking (12-20)
 - Reduce prescription drug misuse and abuse (12-25)

 Prevention Program that uses a multi-pronged approach to reduce underage drinking, prescription drug abuse and related deaths.





Naloxone

- Equip Chickasaw Nation Lighthorse Police with the opioid antagonist medication, Naloxone and provide
 - administration training
- Collaborations
 - Chickasaw Nation Lighthorse
 - Chickasaw Nation Pharmacy







Safe Storage and Disposal

• Educates community members on safe methods to store prescription medications and the proper disposal

Youth Advisory Councils

"Some AI/AN youth are also connected to their communities through Tribal Youth Councils, which help them form trusting and positive relationships with caring adults, link to purposes greater than themselves, and develop leadership skills and strong peer relationships. Youth Councils often engage in community-based projects that address pressing issues for youth, such as suicide, substance abuse, gangs, and violence."- SAMHSA

- Our youth advisory councils inform our programming by:
 - Tailor the messaging we put on social media
 - Choose which prosocial activities to implement
 - Choose how to incorporate cultural activities
 - Assist with the implementation of all activities

and consequently benefit society as a whole." - Lam








